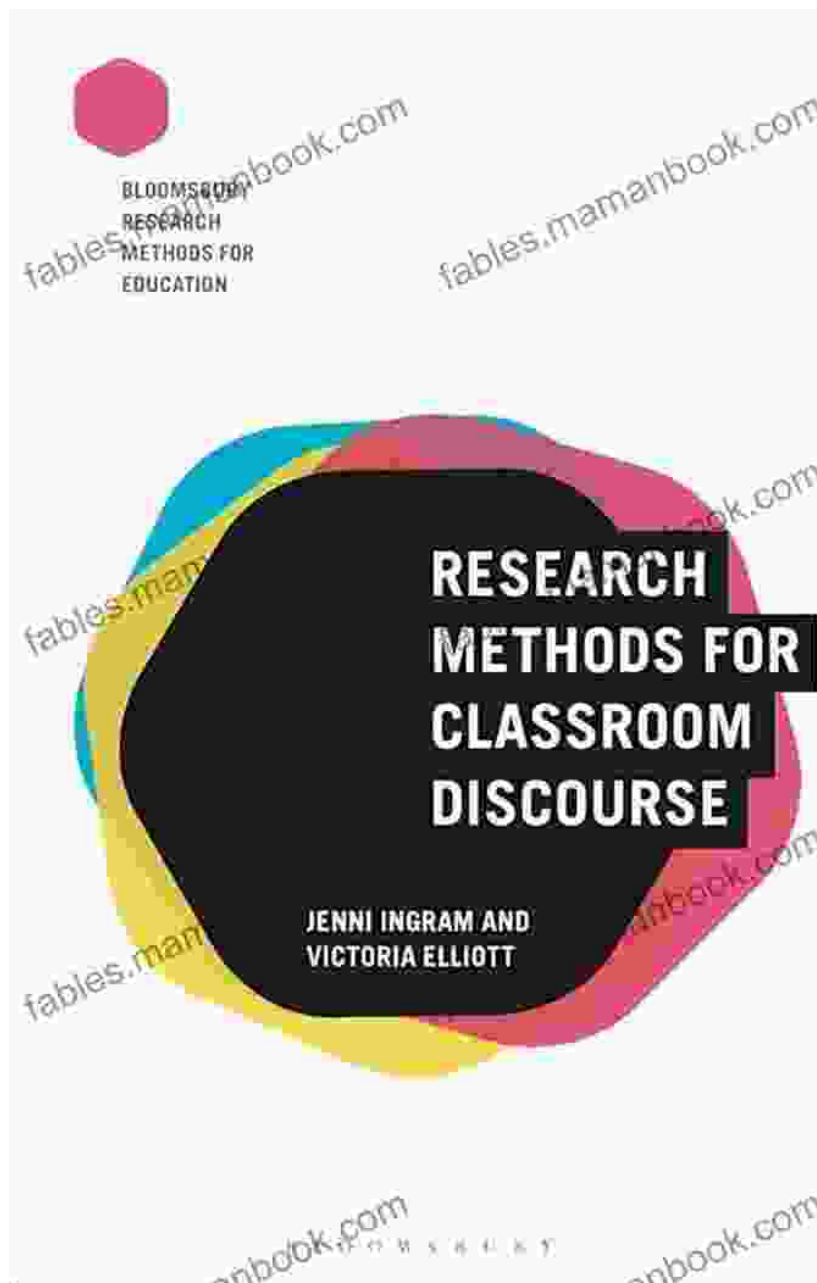

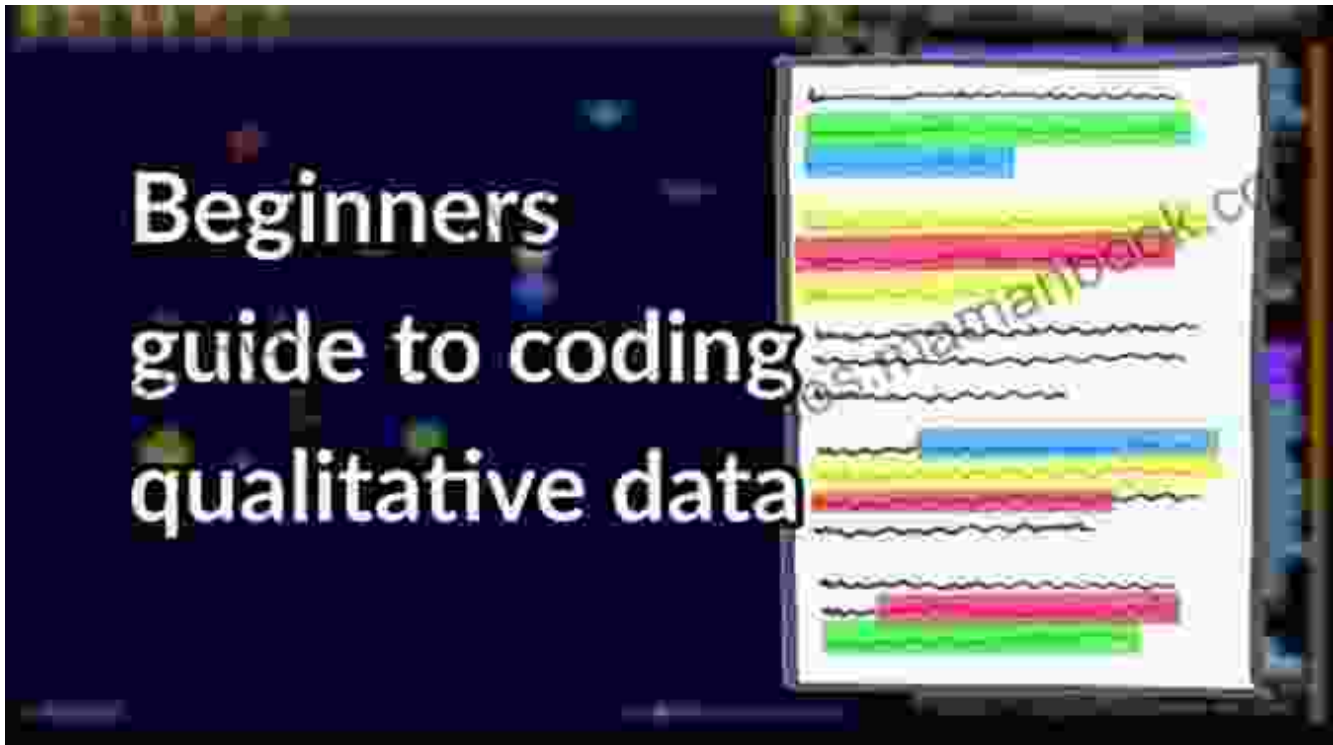
Steve: [Laughs] I keep putting you on the spot. I don't think I put that one in the question either. We're just ad-libbing here.

4. Quantitative Discourse Analysis



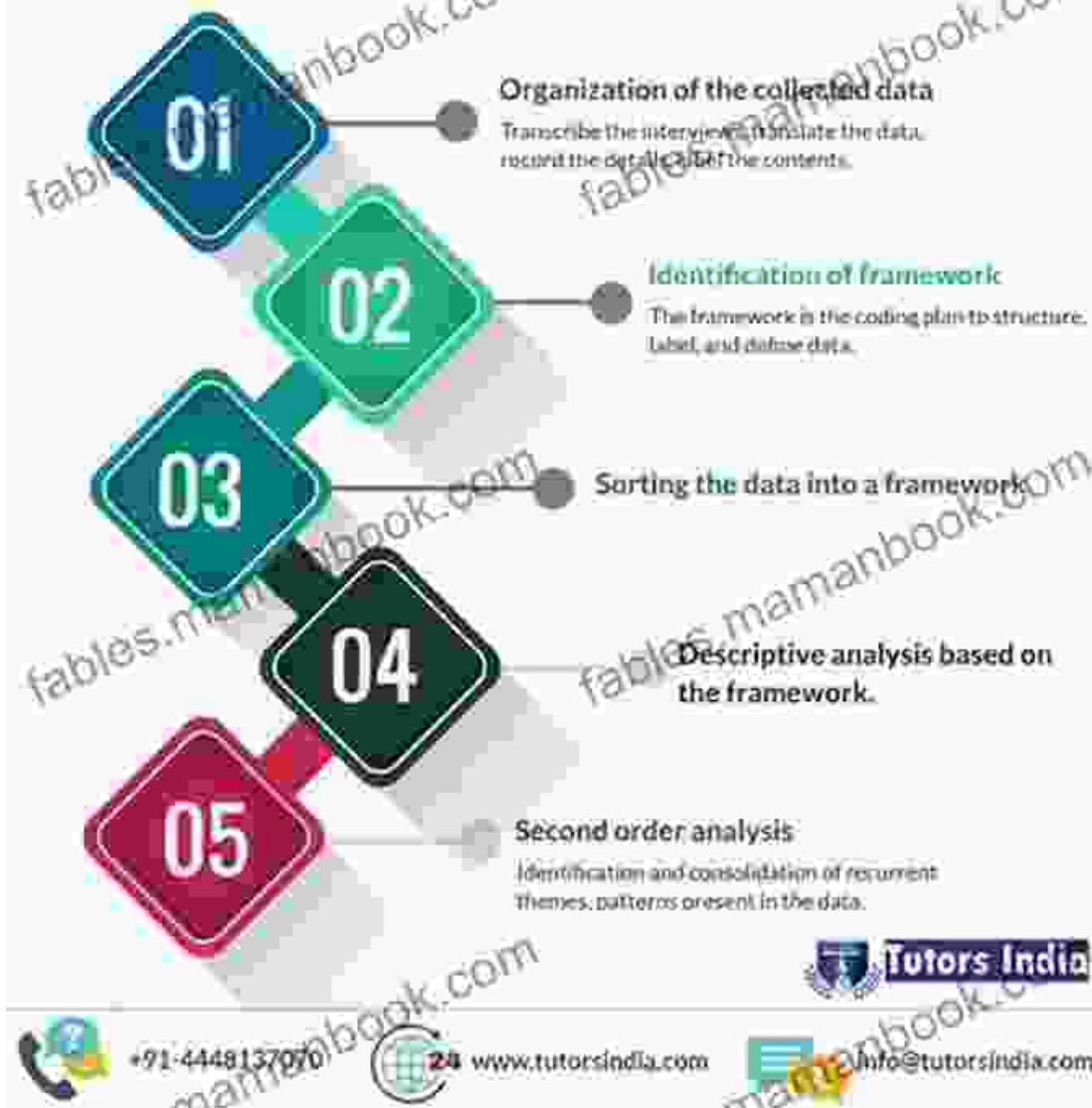
Quantitative discourse analysis uses computational techniques to analyze large corpora of text.

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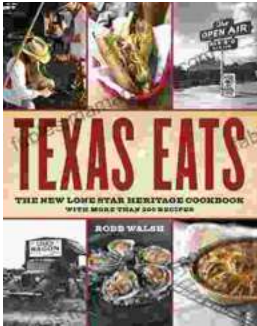
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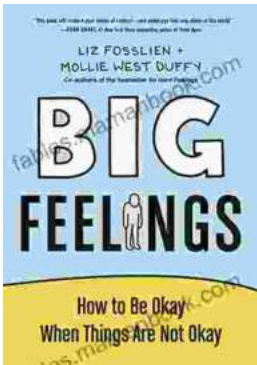
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
